

WESTIE RESCUE YEAR IN REVIEW - 2011

As 2011 draws to a close, I would like to wish you and yours a warm and wonderful holiday season and to share with you a few of our accomplishments that would not have been possible without the generous support of caring friends such as you.

It has been a very busy year for Westie Rescue Mid-Atlantic. In 2011 we rescued and found homes for more than 104 Westies. We also provided assistance to another 73 owners and their dogs. The website www.WestieRescue.com receives over 1,300 hits per day providing a connection for Westie owners. Our volunteers have driven over 22,400 miles to rescue abandoned Westies and to place them in new homes. And we have participated in several extensive puppy mill rescues with Westies coming to us for shelter, treatment and adoption from as far away as Missouri and Kansas.

Thanks to generous supporters like you, these Westies were given a chance when they needed it most. Such was the case with "Richie", whose plight was brought to the attention of Westie Rescue earlier this year.

Animal cruelty can be either abandonment, deliberate abuse, or simply the failure to take care of an animal by not providing even the most basic of care. *Richie* was a victim of such cruelty.



When he was discovered abandoned and living on the streets, he was emaciated, had skin and ear infections, and was clearly in immune system crisis. It was also obvious that he had been attacked by some other animal as he was suffering from some bite wounds and scratches trying to defend himself.

There is no plight sadder than finding these loving Westies tossed onto the streets, or left behind in abandoned homes, or discarded by the side of the highway. Confused, frightened, and unable to fend for themselves – there is no worse terror for these little Terriers.

Molly came to our attention after she had been found by a concerned citizen and contacted Westie Rescue after learning that her local shelter was a high-kill facility.

After considerable medical treatment for her ailments and a few weeks spent with a volunteer foster family, *Molly* was adopted by her forever family this summer.

She is living on a beautiful farm in the Virginia countryside and her new owners, Bruce and Ellie, tell us that time has healed all wounds. *Molly* has overcome the cruelty and neglect of her past and her beautiful spirit shines brightly each day.
